



Twice-Monthly Patrol Report filed by WDDNA's Off-Duty Sheriff's Deputies

PATROL DEPUTY REPORTS

Past Two Weeks Reported in Chronological Order

Saturday, 8 a.m. – 4 p.m., Nov. 25

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 25 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

I reviewed a homeowner's Ring video clip recorded on Thanksgiving of a person in their driveway who looked around and ultimately walked away with a bike. I advised that such incidents should be immediately reported to the Sheriff's non-emergency line at (916) 874-5115.

The rest of the shift was quiet.

Saturday, 4-10 p.m., Nov. 25

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 25 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure. I emailed two homeowners who had packages delivered and reminded them to reach out to someone to keep them safe while they were away.

It was a very chilly night but there were lots of people out walking and decorating their homes for Christmas.

I responded to a report of a homeless man yelling and bothering customers at Mattos Pizzeria, then began walking away on Arden Way toward the river. By the time I arrived he was gone and I was unable to find him on Arden Way.

I monitored all the river access points and multiple stop signs throughout the night, but observed no issues.

Monday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Nov. 27

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 23 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

Schools were back in session, resulting in heavy morning traffic. However, I observed no traffic violations.

I checked on all the parks and river access points, but saw no issues of concern.

Tuesday-Wednesday 8 p.m.-4 a.m., Nov. 28-29

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 21 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

It was very cold and traffic was light. I monitored the river access points and intersections, but observed no issues.

Wednesday 9:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Nov. 29

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 20 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

I responded to the 600 block of Regency Circle regarding a report of a smashed-up vehicle parked there. I determined that it was owned by a non-resident who had parked to go fishing. The car had a current registration and was legally parked.

I responded to a report of a transient at Watt Avenue and Fair Oaks Boulevard, but he was gone when I arrived.

Wednesday 4-10 p.m., Nov. 29

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 20 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

There was very little traffic tonight and I saw no pedestrians around the river access points.

I spoke to a man I observed walking on three different streets after 10 p.m. He explained that he was a Willhaggin resident who enjoys late-night walks.

Later in the evening, I contacted a man and woman sitting in a parked car in front of Ashton park. They told me that they were preparing to leave the area and were gone when I returned later to check.

Thursday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Nov. 30

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 21 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

I stopped three drivers and gave verbal warnings for failing to stop completely at the stop-sign near American River Drive and Estates. While I was parked there, a man approached me and told me that I had also stopped and warned him a few weeks before. He said, as a result, he was now consciously making an effort to stop all the way at the stop signs.

The rest of the shift was quiet.

Friday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Dec. 1

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 13 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

I responded to a report from a resident who had found items in her front yard on Crondall Drive. I looked at the items, which included a tent, duffel bag, a small handbag and other things. I determined that there had been no calls for service in the area the previous night. The resident said she would hold onto the items and review her surveillance video later.

In the morning I monitored traffic at the intersection in front of Rio Americano High School, but observed no violations. I monitored several other intersections, as well, but saw no issues.

Saturday, 8:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m., Dec. 2

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 25 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

I patrolled the area around Ashton Park because Saturday morning soccer games typically generate more traffic. There was very little traffic today.

Although it was wet and cold, there was more foot traffic than usual. I checked the river access point at Harrington and William Pond, but saw no suspicious activity and I observed no traffic violations during my shift.

Saturday, midnight- 7 a.m., Dec. 2-3

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 26 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

I found an email message about potential sideshows in the Teichert parking lot, so I stopped by the Teichert and Lyon office complexes several times. I never saw anyone there.

Vehicle and pedestrian traffic were extremely light, even on American River Drive.

Monday 7 a.m. to 2 p.m., Dec. 4

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 16 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

I patrolled the river access points and checked on all the schools.

I contacted a man on McClaren Drive who appeared to be homeless and lost. He said he was from Rancho Cordova and was looking for a way to get back there, so I gave him directions. I last saw him heading to the bridge at William Pond.

I responded to two burglar alarms. Both were false.

I monitored traffic at Jacob and Keane, but observed no stop sign violations.

Wednesday 4-10 p.m., Dec. 6

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 16 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

I attended the WDDNA association meeting at Jesuit High School and remained to answer questions from residents.

A couple who live on American River Drive near North River Way expressed extreme concern about traffic violations between 3 and 4 p.m. during the school week. They also said students often drive in the bike lane or drive down the turn lane on American River Drive. I explained that deputies monitor traffic and issue citations when they see violations. However, when drivers see a patrol car parked nearby, they are less likely to break the law.

I responded to a report of a truck and trailer parked on the south side of American River Drive late at night. I located the vehicle and determined that it belongs to a nearby homeowner and was parked legally.

Just before 10 p.m., I contacted a couple in a vehicle parked on Harrington near the river access point. After I spoke to them, they left the area and did not return.

Late in my shift, I stopped a man riding his bicycle without a light. I determined that he lived nearby and reminded him of the legal requirement to have a light on his bike when riding at night.

Thursday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Dec. 7

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 17 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

I stopped three vehicles for failing to come to a complete stop at a stop sign near American River Drive and Estates. I issued one citation and gave the other two drivers verbal warnings.

I drove around the schools, but observed no traffic or parking violations.

It was cloudy and the roads were wet. The rest of the shift was quiet

Friday 6 a.m.-1 p.m., Dec. 8

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 20 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

I monitored multiple intersections, but observed no traffic violations.

Around 6 a.m. a resident on Keane Drive reported that somebody knocked loudly on their door multiple times, then left. I checked the area, but did not locate anyone. I met and spoke with the resident about the incident.

I helped search for a suspect with a felony warrant who had fled from patrol units in Sierra Oaks just west of Watt Avenue. A K9 unit eventually found the suspect in a backyard and he was arrested.

Saturday, 1-7 a.m., Dec. 9

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 19 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

The roads were relatively quiet and I saw only two folks out on their bikes in the morning. Vehicle traffic picked up on American River Drive in the morning, but I observed no issues.

Saturday, 8 a.m. – 4 p.m., Dec. 9

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 21 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

In spite of the great weather there was not much pedestrian or vehicular traffic.

I checked river access points and saw that the bike trail did not have much traffic, either.

I spoke to several residents who expressed their appreciation for our patrols.

Saturday, 4-10 p.m., Dec. 9

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 19 listed vacation watch checks. All homes appeared secure.

At 4:50 p.m. I responded to a 911 hang-up call. I was on scene in under a minute, as I was conducting a vacation check on the street next door on Lantern Court. I spoke with the homeowner and determined that the call had been an accident.

All the river access points were quiet.

Park rangers responded to a report of an injured homeless man on the bike trail near Sand Bar Circle. They got him some help.

In another incident, two subjects were seen riding motorized dirt bikes along the bike trail from Jacob to Watt Avenue. Park rangers responded and I checked the neighborhood, as

well, in case the subjects left the parkway and came into the neighborhood. None of us was able to locate the subjects.

IN AN EMERGENCY

If you have an immediate emergency - if your life or property is in immediate danger, if you feel threatened by someone on or near your property, if you have just become the victim of a crime or if you are witnessing a crime in progress:

- CALL 911 from a land line.
- Or, if calling from a cell phone within Sacramento County, call (916) 874-5111.

TO REPORT A CRIME

There are two ways to report a crime to the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department:

1. Call the Sheriff's Department NON-EMERGENCY LINE at (916) 874-5115. To bypass the recorded messaging when you call, dial 0 after the line is answered.

SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY (Not an emergency)

If you see someone engaged in suspicious activity but it is not an emergency, call 916-874-5115 (Sheriff's Department non-emergency line).
