



Twice-Monthly Patrol Report filed by WDDNA's Off-Duty Sheriff's Deputies

PATROL DEPUTY REPORTS

Past Two Weeks Reported in Chronological Order

Tuesday-Wednesday 8 p.m.-4 a.m., Aug. 23-24

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 25 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I made several rounds of the Shelato area between 1 and 2:30 a.m. because of previous criminal activity there. Everything was quiet.

I checked all the river access points and they were clear. Rio Americano High School locked their gates around 10 p.m. Two young adults were hanging out nearby next to their car for a few hours, but they were doing nothing illegal. I drove by to remind them of my presence.

The rest of the shift was quiet.

Thursday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Aug. 25

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 24 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I received an email from a homeowner on Morris Way about an intruder who had entered the home around 5 a.m. The homeowner had left the front door open to let in the cool morning breeze and a man walked in. The homeowner chased him out and the man fled on foot. He may have gotten into a vehicle. The suspect was in his 30s, 6 feet tall, 180 pounds and had tattoos on his right arm. Patrol checked the area but could not locate him. I responded and took a report.

A resident on Del Dayo sent an email advising that someone had broken into his garage and taken some golf clubs.

Friday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Aug. 26

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 25 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I responded to the home on Del Dayo Drive where the homeowner had filed a burglar report yesterday. I also requested that crime scene investigators respond. The homeowner had left his home for a few hours Thursday morning. When he returned, he discovered that someone had broken into his garage and taken his golf clubs.

A homeowner on Fair Oaks Boulevard emailed to say they were arriving in town to move

in and requested that deputies check their property for any homeless subjects. I contacted the homeowner later and advised that no homeless subjects or camps were found, just some trash left behind.

Friday-Saturday, 8 p.m.-4 a.m., Aug. 26-27

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 27 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I paid special attention to Morris Way, where an intruder had attempted to go inside a house earlier in the week.

The river access points were all clear. The Rio Americano High School gates were locked around 10 p.m. and there were no problems at the school.

It was a quiet night.

Monday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Aug. 29

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 26 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I was dispatched to Dovercourt Circle in response to a report that a young male was seen taking two suitcases from the backyard of a home that backed up to the levee. I contacted the homeowner, who said the male was his son.

All the river access points were quiet and there were no problems at the park.

Tuesday-Wednesday 8 p.m.-4 a.m., Aug. 30-31

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 25 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

There was an email reporting that a truck was parked on Stowe Way facing the wrong direction and had not been moved for a week even after the owner said he would move it. I cited the truck for having an expired registration and posted a 72- hour notice on it stating that it would be towed if not moved. I placed that sticker on the passenger side window so all the neighbors could see it.

The Rio Americano High School gates were locked tonight and there were no problems.

All the river access points were clear.

I patrolled Del Dayo, Los Rios and Shelato streets frequently after 2 a.m. due to recent criminal activity there. The only person I saw was an elderly man walking his dog.

Wednesday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Aug. 31

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 29 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

A McClaren Drive member reported that a homeless person had parked across the street from her house. I located the car and female driver, who was asleep at the wheel. I cited her for several infractions and sent her on her way.

I responded to a report of a transient going through recycle cans in the 3900 block of American River Drive. I located the woman pushing a grocery cart full of stuff at American River Drive and Wilhaggin Drive. She checked clear and I sent her on her way out of the neighborhood. She said she wanted to go to Folsom Boulevard, so I pointed the way.

A resident e-mailed me that there was a car parked in front of their house on McClaren

Drive. I arrived at the scene and found the vehicle with its engine running and the female driver asleep at the wheel. She said she "lived down the street" and that her driver's license was recently stolen. After further discussion, she admitted that her license had been suspended due to a DUI, which I confirmed. She also had been required to install an Interlock Ignition Device (IID) in her car. That is a small breathalyzer device for car ignitions that prevents users from being able to start their vehicle after drinking alcohol. She had not installed it. I cited her for driving on a suspended license and not having the IID.

The rest of the day was hot but quiet.

Thursday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Sept. 1

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 41 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I responded to a report that a suspicious person had been seen walking in the back yard of a neighbor's home on Ashton Drive. The person turned out to be the neighbor's caregiver.

The rest of the shift was quiet.

Friday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Sept. 2

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 44 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I stopped and warned a driver at the intersection of American River Drive and Ashton Drive. I monitored traffic around the schools but observed no issues.

The rest of the shift was quiet.

Friday-Saturday, 8 p.m.-4 a.m., Sept. 2-3

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 41 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

It was a hot but relatively quiet evening. I encountered a couple of teenagers hanging out in front of Rio Americano High School after dark. They left. I later responded to a report of vehicles gathering at Rio, but they were gone when I arrived.

Around 2 a.m. a couple of loud booms came from the levee near Crondall and Estates, but it was quiet after that.

I checked all the river access points and found them clear. Vehicle and foot traffic was very light.

Saturday, 8 a.m. – 4 p.m., Sept. 3

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 45 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I received an email from a resident in the 4200 block of Stowe Way regarding an abandoned vehicle. Sgt. Goff had tagged the vehicle for abatement 72-hours prior, so I had it towed.

I responded to a report of a burglary in the 4000 block of American River Drive. The burglar had broken into the homeowner's vehicle, which was parked on the street. The burglar found the garage door opener in the vehicle and used it to enter the garage, where he rummaged through another vehicle but did not appear to take anything.

NOTE: It is important to never leave a garage door opener in a vehicle that is parked outside the garage.

Monday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Sept. 5

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 39 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I responded to a burglar alarm in the 400 block of Exeter Street. The homeowner had just returned after running an errand. The alarm had been set off by a neighbor who had attempted to close the open garage door.

All river accesses points and the park checked clear.

Tuesday-Wednesday 8 p.m.-4 a.m., Sept. 6-7

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 25 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

The day was blazing hot, which explains why everyone stayed inside. I didn't see a soul out and about during my shift.

Thursday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Sept. 8

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 30 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I assisted patrol with a panic alarm in 1000 Block of Jacob Lane. It was a false alarm.

I assisted a stranded motorist who was stalled in the middle lane of Fair Oaks Boulevard near Elsdon Circle. The driver asked that dispatch call for a tow truck for him. I asked him if he wanted to wait in my air-conditioned patrol vehicle because it was 108 degrees outside. He happily accepted. A tow truck arrived in about 15 minutes.

The rest of the shift was quiet.

Friday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Sept. 9

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 38 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

A member reported two vehicles parked facing the wrong way in front of a neighbor's house on Tennyson Way.

I contacted the owner of the vehicles. He is a fire evacuee from Forest Hill who spent last evening moving all of his belongings here to his parents' home. Due to the fact that other vehicles were parked on the street when his vehicles were towed here, they had to be parked that way. I advised him of the law. He assured me that he would correct the problem as soon as possible. Based on the circumstances, I think it was reasonable to give him some time to comply.

Friday-Saturday, 8 p.m.-4 a.m., Sept. 10-11

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 38 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I responded to a home on McClaren regarding an email about homeless people nearby. I answered the homeowners' questions and explained that park rangers are handling the issue.

Jesuit High School had a rally and many vehicles and pedestrians were around the area getting ready for the "Holy Bowl" game against Christian Brothers Saturday night. I saw a

man walking on Lantern Court who appeared to be out of place. He turned out to be a parent of a Jesuit student just trying to pass the time.

I observed a few kids at Ashton Park after the park was closed and advised them of park hours. They left the park without incident.

I spoke to the occupants of a few vehicles parked in front of Rio Americano High School near midnight. They were waiting for their kids to be dropped off by bus after an out-of-town football game. I checked a vehicle on Whitehall Way and determined that the driver was waiting for his mother to get dropped off from a party. He checked clear as the mom and neighbors pulled up

Sunday, 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Sept. 11

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 34 vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I responded to a burglar alarm on American River Drive. It turned out to be an accidental activation.

Several people were out walking dogs. I issued warnings to a large number of bicycle riders I had seen running stop signs.

- Or, if calling from a cell phone within Sacramento County, call (916) 874-5111.

TO REPORT A CRIME

There are two ways to report a crime to the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department:

1. Call the Sheriff's Department NON-EMERGENCY LINE at (916) 874-5115. To bypass the recorded messaging when you call, dial 0 after the line is answered.

If you see someone engaged in suspicious activity but it is not an emergency, call 916-874-5115 (Sheriff's Department non-emergency line).
