1. Under the "Billing" link, click on "Invoices."
2. A list of your invoice history will appear. Invoices that have been paid will say "Paid" in green. Your most recent invoice is at the top. If you have not paid it, it will say "Sent" in blue.
3. If it says "Sent," you can either click on the invoice number or the "Action" button. Either action will take you to the invoice.
4. When your invoice appears, click on the blue "Pay Now" button at the top right and it will take you to a form that you can use to enter and submit your payment information.

If you prefer, you can pay by check. Make the check payable to WDDNA and mail it, along with your name and address, to WDDNA, P.O. Box 2273, Carmichael, CA 95609.

PATROL DEPUTY REPORTS

Saturday, 4-10 p.m., Oct. 25

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 24 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

There was an email stating that the homeowner had a catalytic converter stolen on Wycombe sometime between 8 p.m. Oct. 24 and 8 a.m. Oct. 25. The car was parked in the driveway. A report was filed.

I made sure to drive around Wycombe and area streets a number of times to provide a visible presence.

There were a bunch of loud fireworks going off throughout the neighborhood starting at 10 p.m. I tried tracking them down, but it may have been kids driving around in a car setting off fireworks. It happened in Arden Oaks and Arden Park, as well.

Monday 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., Oct. 27

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 22 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked the river access points and Ashton Park multiple times, but did not see any problems. The salmon were running, so there were lots of people out fishing.

I monitored a couple intersections, but observed no traffic violations.

Monday-Tuesday 9 p.m. to 5 a.m., Oct. 27-28

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 18 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I responded to a report of a restraining order violation in the 1400 block of Thistlewood Way. The suspect fled the area before I arrived. According to the reporting party, the suspect has been stalking the family and violating the restraining order. Detectives were already assigned to the case and have been updated .

Tuesday-Wednesday 8 p.m.-4 a.m., Oct. 28-29

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 18 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I was waved down by a man walking near McDonald's at Arden and Fair Oaks Boulevard. He was inquiring about a homeless woman he has seen in the area recently. I said we have had multiple contacts with her and she has refused help.

Wednesday 10:15 a.m.-3:15 p.m., Oct. 29

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 18 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked the river access points and all the three schools.

I responded to Rio Americano High School where a 17-year-old student had reportedly assaulted a staff member. When I arrived, the boy had already been detained by staff. The victim was not injured and declined to press assault charges. The student was suspended and a parent picked him up without further incident.

Thursday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Oct. 30

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 18 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked the schools, but found no parking issues.

It was a nice day, so there were a lot of extra people out enjoying the sun.

Sunday, 3-11 p.m., Nov. 2

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 17 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I responded to a report that a homeless man was yelling and kicking at things as he walked eastbound in the 1100 block of McClaren Drive. I located the subject on Arden Way. He was on active parole and had apparent medical issues. I had a patrol deputy give him a courtesy ride to Kaiser Hospital.

I saw a homeless man and woman on American River Drive and Saverien pushing a large wagon full of their belongings. I had a conversation with them and advised them to leave the area. They headed north on Saverien to Fair Oaks Boulevard.

I checked all the river access points and Ashton Park. There were no issues.

Monday 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., Nov. 3

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 14 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

There were lots of people out enjoying the nice weather.

I checked all the river access points and Ashton Park. There was nothing noteworthy to report.

I monitored a few intersections, but did not observe any traffic violations.

Monday-Tuesday 9 p.m. to 5 a.m., Nov. 3-4

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 15 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked all the river access points and Ashton Park.. I didn't observe any problems.

I monitored a couple intersections, but saw no traffic violations.

Tuesday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Nov. 4

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 19 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I walked through Ashton Park. It was clear of any problems. The playground was very busy with kids and their parents. I let them know that I was just doing a security check and passed out some stickers.

A new member of the WDDNA sent an email concerned about a speeding vehicle in the 4000 block of Brompton Court. I called him and provided him the Sheriff's Department non-emergency number (916-874-5115) for future reference. I drove through his area twice during my shift, but did not observe any traffic violations today.

I checked all river access points. I saw no suspicious vehicles or subjects.

Two women waved me down at Estates and American River Drive. They had parked their vehicle on North River Way and went walking on the American River Parkway. But, when they ended their walk, they could not find their way back to their car. I gave them directions.

I stopped and cited a driver for failing to obey the stop sign at American River Drive and Kingsford. The 18-year-old driver had an expired license and couldn't provide proof of insurance for the vehicle, which belongs to his parents. After citing him, I released the vehicle to a family member.

Tuesday-Wednesday 8 p.m.-4 a.m., Nov. 4-5

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 19 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I monitored all the usual hot spots along the river, parks and major intersections.

I monitored Thistlewood Way and North River Way in response to two separate reports of unwanted guests showing up.

Wednesday 9:45 a.m.-3:45 p.m., Nov. 5

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 18 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked the river access points and the three schools. There were no problems.

I monitored traffic at several intersections, but saw no traffic violations.

Thursday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Nov. 6

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 20 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I stopped and cited a Rio Americano student for running the stop sign at Crondall and Estates. I had cited the same student earlier in the school year, so this was a second moving violation.

I also stopped and cited another driver for failing to stop at the same intersection. The driver lives in the neighborhood and was driving home.

I check the streets around Rio Americano High School, but observed no parking issues.

Friday, 5 p.m.- 12 a.m., Nov. 7

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 20 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I received multiple emails regarding multiple vehicles parked illegally blocking driveways and a fire hydrant while attending an estate sale on Alton Court. By the time my shift began, all the vehicles were parked legally.

I checked the river access points and Ashton Park multiple times, but saw no problems.

I monitored a couple intersections, but did not observe any traffic violations.

Saturday, 8 a.m. – 4 p.m., Nov. 8

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 23 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I was waved down on Sherlock Way by a resident who had heard four gunshots near the river the night before. I knocked on the doors of four other residents. They all said they had heard the same thing coming from the direction of the river access. I provided the information to park rangers.

In response to parking problems associated with an estate sale on Alton Court, I monitored the area multiple times during my shift and advised some drivers to be more conscientious when parking. I had a lengthy conversation with the sale director. I learned that this was not an "average" sale. A long-term resident of this home had passed away and the home and estate property were being consolidated through a licensed estate dealer.

Unfortunately, such sales attract a variety of shoppers, some with poor parking skills. The director assured me that she would continue to work with the affected neighbors to mitigate the problem.

I spoke to a number of neighbors and also suggested that they call the Sheriff's Department parking control office in the event of any egregious violations.

The same home had been unsuccessfully targeted by a burglar on Friday morning. Two subjects entered the locked yard and were confronted at the front door by a hired security guard as they were attempting to breach the front door. Both subjects fled on foot, but were recorded on surveillance camera and their images were submitted to the Sheriff's Office.

Saturday, 4-10 p.m., Nov. 8

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 21 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I responded to a report that two teenage girls were seen running down Piccadilly screaming for help and may have been followed by a sedan occupied by three boys. I had seen the girls walking around the neighborhood throughout my shift. I arrived on Piccadilly and spoke with the complainant and the two 17-year-old girls. One of their mothers was also on scene. I determined that no crime had occurred and the vehicle may have been recognized as belonging to a student at the high school. We had a long talk about safety, being aware of their surroundings and calling 911 if needed. Everyone was appreciative of the quick response.

Sunday, 3-11 p.m., Nov. 9

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 22 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I was dispatched to the 4000 block of American River Drive in response to a report of a theft. Unknown subjects had stolen two tires off an SUV. I took a report.

I checked on the river access points and Ashton Park multiple times, but did not observe any problems.

I monitored several intersections along American River Drive, but observed no traffic violations.

Monday 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., Nov. 10

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 17 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked the river access points and Ashton Park. They checked clear for any problems. All San Juan Schools were out of session today due to the Veteran's Day Holiday, so traffic was light.

I monitored a couple of intersections, but saw no traffic violations.

IN AN EMERGENCY

If you have an immediate emergency - if your life or property is in immediate danger, if you feel threatened by someone on or near your property, if you have just become the victim of a crime or if you are witnessing a crime in progress:

- CALL 911 from a land line.
- Or, if calling from a cell phone within Sacramento County, call (916) 874-5111.

TO REPORT A CRIME

There are two ways to report a crime to the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department:

1. Call the Sheriff's Department NON-EMERGENCY LINE at (916) 874-5115. To bypass the recorded messaging when you call, dial 0 after the line is answered.
