



Twice-Monthly Patrol Report filed by WDDNA's Off-Duty Sheriff's Deputies

PATROL DEPUTY REPORTS

Past Two Weeks Reported in Chronological Order

June 22 burglary

A residential burglary was reported in the 4400 block of Ashton Drive. According to the report, it occurred sometime between 6 and 11 a.m. on Saturday, June 22. The homeowners reportedly left their rear slider unlocked and that was the point of entry for the burglar(s). Jewelry, cash, checkbooks and sports memorabilia were taken.

Tuesday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., June 11

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 33 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I came across a truck that had an expired registration and appeared to have been parked in one spot for a very long time. I requested parking enforcement to respond and place a 72-hour parking notice on it.

I responded to a burglar alarm on Thornley. The owner was inside and confirmed that he had accidentally set off the alarm.

Rio Americano High School is out for the summer, so traffic was light and I observed no violations.

Tuesday-Wednesday 8 p.m.-4 a.m., June 11-12

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 36 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

In response to a request by a resident, I made sure to check Jaimewood Court and the river access points for suspicious activity. Everything was clear. I heard a few fireworks go off in the distance, but could not identify the source.

There was a car accident at Watt Avenue and Fair Oaks Boulevard around 11p.m. I stayed on scene until CHP arrived. No one was hurt.

Wednesday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., June 12

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 34 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked the river access points and the schools. There were no issues.

It was very hot today and very few people were outside.

I had a vehicle towed in the 5200 block of Tamsen Court. It had been cited by the Sheriff's Department parking detail, had an expired registration and had not been moved in some time.

Thursday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., June 13

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 38 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I was waved down about a vehicle that had been towed. The homeowner said the vehicle had been moved onto the street while some home repairs were being done. It had an expired registration and had received a 72-hour parking notice, but had not been moved, so it was towed. I explained the process of getting the vehicle out of impound.

A mountain lion had reportedly been seen near the Estates Drive river access point several days ago. I checked the area, but did not see the mountain lion.

Friday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., June 14

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 37 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked the vacant lot located on Crondall Drive. It was clear of any suspicious activity.

I patrolled Jamiewood Court twice to check for suspicious transient activity, but observed none.

I checked all the river access points and traveled side streets as well as the main thoroughfares.

Saturday, 8 a.m. – 4 p.m., June 15

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I responded to a report from a homeowner on Wilhaggin Drive whose Ring camera had recorded a woman walking through the back yard during the early morning. I reviewed the video and confirmed the woman did walk into the back yard. I met with the homeowner. Because the home was for sale, I suggested that the woman may have been curious about the property. I told him to call if anything else looked suspicious.

We had received an email about a suspicious vehicle that had been parked on Battlewood earlier in the week. A Sheriff's unit had responded, but the vehicle left when they saw the residents looking at them through a window.

Monday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., June 17

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 31 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

A homeowner on Marlborough Way reported that a white car showed up in front of her home during the night. She could see what appeared to be a gas can inside the car. When I arrived, I confirmed that the car had an empty gas can inside, along with two other empty five-gallon containers, a bicycle, a tire and other miscellaneous property. The car's registration had expired, the exterior looked beat up and there was a flat tire on the front driver side. There were some bicycle tires in the trunk, as well as a piece of garden hose that was about eight feet long. Another neighbor told me that the car showed up at about 3 a.m. The driver had tried to change the flat tire and then walked off. From what was inside the car, it appeared that the man had probably been looking for cars from which to siphon gas. I had the car towed.

I stopped and cited a driver at Jacob and Keane for running the stop sign.

Tuesday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., June 18

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed 26 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

All river access points checked clear.

I responded to a request to check on the welfare of a resident on Shelato Way. A neighbor noted that the garage had been left open for several days. When I arrived, the garage door was open and a white pickup truck was parked in the driveway. There was trash all over

the garage and driveway. I knocked on the door, but nobody answered. I spoke with a neighbor, who said that people had been coming and going at the house at various times of the day and night. I documented the case and shared the information with a code enforcement officer later during my shift.

I was waved down by a resident concerned about a vehicle parked on Del Dayo Drive. I checked the vehicle. It was currently registered, but appeared to have been parked in one spot for a long time. I contacted parking enforcement to respond and place a 72-hour notice on it.

I responded to a location on Chancery Way to assist a code enforcement official dealing with the uncooperative owner of a vehicle that was being towed. I mediated the situation. After removing her property from the vehicle, the owner allowed her vehicle to be towed.

A parking enforcement officer requested my assistance on American River Drive. The officer was having difficulty determining if a vehicle parked there had been abandoned. I had not seen it before, so could not confirm how long it had been parked there. He decided to place a 72-hour tag on it.

Tuesday-Wednesday 8 p.m.-4 a.m., June 18-19

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 32 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

It was very nice weather and there were lots of people out tonight.

At 11 p.m., I was dispatched to assist patrol with a call on North River Way. A woman homeowner appeared to have some mental health issues and had been calling 911 and rambling on. When we contacted her, she screamed and yelled and eventually shut the door on us. Patrol filed a request with the department's mental health crisis response team to offer support services to the woman.

I contacted a couple of people sitting on the sidewalk at Ashton Park and advised them to move along.

I checked all the river access points and all were quiet.

Wednesday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., June 19

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 34 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked all the schools and river access points. All were quiet.

I cited a vehicle parked in the 5200 block of Shelato Way for having an expired registration.

I checked on a man who had been sitting in a parked vehicle at Arden Way and House Works Drive for several hours. He said he had several medical issues and that his car had broken down. He said his cell phone was dead, that he was lost, had a headache and that his catheter had broken. I had Metro Fire respond and he was transported to a local hospital.

Thursday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., June 20

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 26 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

A resident had reported that there was broken vehicle glass on the ground near Jacob Lane and the river access. I checked the area, but did not see any vehicles with broken windows and no one had called in to make a report.

Friday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., June 21

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 27 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked the vacant lot located on Crondall Drive. It was clear of any suspicious activity.

I patrolled Jamiewood Court, as requested by a resident concerned about transient activity in the area. I observed no issues.

Saturday, 4-10 p.m., June 22

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 22 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked all the river access points. There was no suspicious activity.

I heard lots of illegal fireworks go off in surrounding neighborhoods, but nothing in Wilhaggin or Del Dayo.

Monday 7 a.m. to 2 p.m., June 24

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 21 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked all of the river access points and there were no concerns.

I stopped and cited a driver for a stop sign violation at Wilhaggin and Wycombe.

HOW TO CALL FOR HELP

IN AN EMERGENCY

If you have an immediate emergency - if your life or property is in immediate danger, if you feel threatened by someone on or near your property, if you have just become the victim of a crime or if you are witnessing a crime in progress:

- CALL 911 from a land line.
- Or, if calling from a cell phone within Sacramento County, call (916) 874-5111.

TO REPORT A CRIME

There are two ways to report a crime to the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department:

1. Call the Sheriff's Department NON-EMERGENCY LINE at (916) 874-5115. To bypass the recorded messaging when you call, dial 0 after the line is answered.
