



Twice-Monthly Patrol Report filed by WDDNA's Off-Duty Sheriff's Deputies

PATROL DEPUTY REPORTS

Past Two Weeks Reported in Chronological Order

Thursday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Aug. 27

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 19 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I responded to a report of a homeless person camping near American River Drive and Watt Avenue. I contacted two subjects and advised them to pack up and move along. I stayed there for several minutes while they gathered their belongings and advised them that I would be back later and they had better be gone.

I later drove by and saw that the tent was still up and there was still someone there. I announced myself and the same woman I had spoken with was inside. When I asked why she was still there, she said, "Well officer, I did leave as you told me, but I just came back a little bit ago." She claimed she was unaware that I wanted her to permanently leave the area. So, I issued her a misdemeanor citation for trespassing.

I responded to an email from a member who said a homeless man had come to their home on Los Rios Drive just before midnight on Aug. 18, claiming he used to live there and asked to be let in. I drove the area and did not see anyone matching the description. It appears it is the same subject who had been sleeping on Battlewood Way.

All schools were back in session so there was lots of vehicular traffic.

Friday, 8 p.m.- 4 a.m., Aug. 28-29

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 17 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I responded to a WDDNA member who found a driver's license near her home in the 4000 block of Crondall Drive. I retrieved the Oklahoma driver's license and will turn it in to the Sheriff's Department for safekeeping.

I spoke to a WDDNA board member about the homeless man who had been seen sleeping on Battlewood Way. I reported that the homeless man's name is Jeffrey. A home on Los Rios Drive previously belonged to his grandmother and he lived with her until the home was sold. He has been contacted recently over the past few months at shopping centers in the surrounding area. I monitored the Shelato, Battlewood, and Los Rios areas several times during the night, but did not see him.

At approximately 10 p.m., I responded to a 911 hang-up on Shelato near Los Rios. I spoke with the homeowner, who explained that a teenager's friend was visiting and had accidentally dialed 911.

At approximately 11 p.m., I stopped two young men riding electric bicycles near Kingsford and Arden Way. The bicycles were legal, but they did not have the required rear tail light

or reflector. I advised them of the rules of the road and the proper lighting requirements for their bicycles.

Saturday, 8 a.m. – 4 p.m., Aug. 29

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 17 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

Deputies were dispatched to a home on Keane Drive. A juvenile had reportedly met with an adult after an online discussion. The juvenile was located and the suspect was detained. The homeowner – an elderly man – was not involved.

In the afternoon, I checked a campsite at Watt and American River Drive where a WDDNA deputy had previously cited a woman for failing to leave the site. I found the same woman sleeping on a heaping pile of debris. She refused any available alternative services for assistance, so I gave her two hours to leave the property or go to jail. She was gone when I returned near end of watch, along with a lot of her personal belongings. However, a pile of trash remained, so I placed a cleanup referral to the Sheriff's Department homeless outreach team.

I contacted a man on the opposite side of the road who was sleeping on the sidewalk. He tried to debate my verbal instructions to leave, but he lost. He went the opposite direction on his skateboard.

I checked all the river access points, which were clear. Ashton Park was being fully used by organized parties.

Saturday, 5:30-11:30 p.m., Aug. 29

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 17 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I drove through the Los Rios, Shelato and Battlewood areas several times checking for the homeless man who had been reported there. I did not see him.

I was waved down near Arden Way and Gregory by a man who wanted me to sign off on his fix-it ticket for failing to pay his registration. Once everything checked out, I signed the ticket.

An elderly homeowner near Battlewood and Brickwell had left her garage door open. I knocked on the door and let her know. She closed the garage door and said she was thankful that we were looking out for her.

I checked the river access points and Ashton Park. All were quiet.

Sunday, 3- 11 p.m., Aug. 30

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 16 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked the Los Rios, Shelato and Battlewood areas, but did not see the homeless man who had been reported there.

I checked all the river access points and Ashton Park. I observed no suspicious activity.

Monday 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., Aug. 31

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 18 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I monitored the Battlewood, Los Rios and Shelato areas, but did not see the homeless man who had been there.

I checked all the river access points and Ashton Park, but saw nothing of concern.

I responded to a 911 hang-up call at Jesuit High School. Front office staff determined that an employee had accidentally pocket-dialed 911.

Tuesday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Sept. 1

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 20 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I conducted extra patrols on Los Rios, Battlewood and Shelato. I did not see the homeless man or find any indication that he had been in the area.

I checked all the river access points and Ashton Park. There was nothing of concern to report.

Wednesday 9 a.m.-5 p.m., Sept. 2

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 16 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

There was a request to monitor Dovercourt Circle following threats received by a homeowner. I drove by several times. There were no cars or activity at the house.

I responded to a report of a man scavenging through a homeowner's garbage cans. I located the man and advised him of the Sacramento County code prohibiting looking through other people's waste containers. He said he understood and left the area.

I checked the former homeless camp site at Watt and American River Drive. Nobody was there. The Battlewood area checked clear of the sidewalk sleeper.

Thursday 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Sept. 3

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 21 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I drove by the home on Dovercourt Circle where family members had received threats. All was quiet.

I checked all the river access points and Ashton Park. There were no issues of concern. Traffic was heavy, but I observed no traffic violations.

Friday, 8:30 p.m.- 4:30 a.m., Sept. 4

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 27 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I responded to an email from a homeowner in the 4100 block of Ashton Drive who reported that two vehicles filled with young adults had been visiting on the street in front of his house, eating and socializing. When they started to drive away, the homeowner asked them to pick up their trash. They eventually left, but were yelling and attempting to get the homeowner into some type of confrontation. After the vehicles drove away, the homeowner provided the license plate information.

I responded to a second email from a member asking me to check out a car on Ashton Drive near Ashton Park. The member said they were walking their dog down Ashton Drive and noticed a blue car parked in front of a home in the 4200 block of Ashton. The car's windows were covered from the inside with window shades. When they returned from their walk, they took a picture of the car.

The following day, the member noticed that the car was still there. They contacted the homeowner on Ashton to ask if she knew who owned the car. She did not, but stated that she had also noticed the vehicle sitting there.

I drove by to check the vehicle. The car was registered legally, but it appeared that someone may have been sleeping in it. I checked the area several times during the night, but did not observe anyone inside the vehicle.

Since the car was parked slightly on the sidewalk and had not moved for several days, I issued a 72-hour violation and placed the sticker to move the vehicle on the driver's

window.

I received another email from a member on Gary Way asking that we deal with two inoperable cars parked in the 1400 and 1500 blocks of Gary Way. One of them was sitting on car jacks. I spoke with one homeowner regarding an inoperable van. The homeowner said they would move it. I asked Parking Enforcement to cite the other vehicle.

I monitored the Los Rios and Battlewood areas, but did not observe the homeless subject who previously had been seen sleeping there.

I checked on the Dovercourt Circle address where threatening messages had been received, but saw nothing suspicious.

The high school football game created lots of traffic through the end of the game. I made myself visible to deter traffic problems. Ashton Park was quiet all night.

Saturday, 5 p.m. -1 a.m., Sept. 5-6

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 30 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I reviewed the previous patrol log and noticed there had been an ongoing issue with a blue car parked in the 4200 block of Ashton. I checked the area three times during the shift. It was unoccupied on the first check and then gone by the second and third checks.

I checked all the river access points , but saw nothing of importance to report.

Sunday, 12- 6 p.m., Sept. 6

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 27 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

There were several people playing volleyball at Ashton Park and having a good time.

I checked all locations where homeless or suspicious individuals had been reported. All were clear.

I checked Dovercourt Circle, where homeowners had received threats. There was nothing suspicious in the area.

Monday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Sept. 7

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 27 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked all the river access points. They were busy due to the Labor Day holiday and the weather was ideal. But I saw nothing of concern.

I received an email from a member regarding a vacant house with a broken front window in the 3900 block of American River Drive. The member had contacted the homeowner in Texas, who said she would have someone repair the window. I arrived at the house a short time later and observed a glass company on scene repairing the front window. I also checked the rear of the residence, which was secure. I emailed the member with an update and advised her that we would add the residence to our list to monitor.

I monitored a couple of intersections along American River Drive, but saw no traffic violations.

Tuesday 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., Sept. 8

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 25 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I checked Battlewood and Los Rios areas for transient issues, but saw no problems. As requested, I also checked the 1400 block of Gary Way, the 4200 block of American River

Drive and a home in the 4700 block of Dovercourt whose owner received threats. All were clear of problems.

I checked Ashton Park and all the river access points. There were no issues.

Traffic was light. I monitored Ashton at American River Drive, Saverien at Ashton and several three-way intersections during my shift. I saw no violations justifying a stop.

Wednesday 7 a.m.- 3 p.m., Sept. 9

I patrolled the neighborhood and completed all 24 scheduled vacation watch checks. All homes were secure.

I continued to check on recent areas of concern on Battlewood and Los Rios Drive for a transient and the 4700 block of Dovercourt where threats were made by a known individual. I also checked the 1400 block of Gary Way and a home in the 4200 block of American River Drive. I saw no issues.

I responded to a report of a man and woman in a small white hatchback going through recycle bins in the area of Crondall and Wilhaggin. I drove the area, but was unable to locate the subjects.

I responded to a report of a suspicious blue Honda van with junk piled on it on Dunster Way. A young man was seen sleeping inside. I contacted the subject and recognized him from a prior call of a similar nature. He stated that he had been going through recycle bins. I advised him of the law prohibiting such activity. I also told him that his rear license plate was covered with junk tied on the back and that his vehicle was not currently registered. Sheriff's Department records indicated that the young man had no wants or warrants and his driver's license was valid. He chose to leave the area.

I responded to a burglar alarm on Los Rios. The owner was home and had accidentally set it off.

I responded to a 911 hang-up call at a home in the 700 block of Morris Way. The call was canceled as accidental just as I arrived.

HOW TO CALL FOR HELP

IN AN EMERGENCY

If you have an immediate emergency - if your life or property is in immediate danger, if you feel threatened by someone on or near your property, if you have just become the victim of a crime or if you are witnessing a crime in progress:

- CALL 911 from a land line.
- Or, if calling from a cell phone within Sacramento County, call (916) 874-5111.

TO REPORT A CRIME

There are two ways to report a crime to the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department:

1. Call the Sheriff's Department NON-EMERGENCY LINE at (916) 874-5115. To bypass the recorded messaging when you call, dial 0 after the line is answered.
